"Part of a Hosta Show Can Happen Year Round"

As we look out over the hosta garden beds at this time of year, we see the foliage of our prized hosta cultivars well past their prime, with many on the downward slide toward winter. Clumps of hostas that offered up excellent leaves to pick from to exhibit at a Hosta Show in June, now are nothing more than a matted golden mess laying on the ground. We remember the local, regional and national hosta shows that we participated in this past summer and think to ourselves that we don't have to think about any shows for the next six or seven months.


However, there is one category of a Hosta Show that you can deal with year-round and the upcoming winter months present an ideal time to think about and put together your exhibit in this show division. Division IV – Educational Displays is a show division that is simple to enter, can be worked on during the off-season and is applicable to situations outside of the hosta show in which it is exhibited. The only criteria an Educational Display needs to meet is it must pertain to hostas. After meeting that threshold, the following judging criteria are used:

Educational Value (50 points)

 Points based on Theme, Originality and Materials Used

Staging (50 points)

Points based on Arrangement, Attractiveness and Neatness



The nice thing about Educational Displays is that they can be put together by all levels of hosta society members and can cover all levels of hosta knowledge. A simple display covering one aspect of hosta growing and cultivation geared toward "newbies" to the genus *Hosta* can be entered alongside the results of a full-blown scientific study of hosta hybridization. Both displays have an equal chance of winning the Grand Award for Division IV.

Why should you and/or other members of your local society consider putting together an Educational Display? Foremost, all local, regional and national hosta societies have an educational component as a part of their overall mission and a display can help to address that aspect. Secondly, an educational display can help to answer routine questions from the general public, as well as imparting general

information in an efficient and cost-effective manner. Finally, a well-thought-out and executed display can help recruit new members to your society, as well as providing current members with new information about their favorite plant.

So how do you get started in putting together an Educational Display? First, put together a list of the top questions that you and other members are asked and what general categories do they fit in. After that, let your imagination go to work to brainstorm how you might present the information in a creative and unique manner. Don't overlook all of the different media and don't be afraid to try something new and radically different. Finally, have fun putting together the display and using it in a creative manner as part of your group's program and outreach!! I'm looking forward to seeing all of your efforts at next year's Hosta Shows!!

Volunteer and Contributor Award Opportunities 2017 - It's About PARTICIPATION!

Participation is essential when it comes to recognition. Each year awards are presented to membership in recognition of their involvement and /or contribution to the AHS. These awards can be for participation in specific events such as the AHS Hosta Show or Photography contest to lifetime contributions in the areas of hybridizing or service. In addition, some awards are specific to contributions to the larger AHS organization and others are to recognize membership at the local society level. "What to do Wednesday"? — Hump Day never looked so Hostastonishing!

Of course you don't *have* to arrive on Wednesday June 11th for the 2017 American Hosta Society National Covention — but if you do, you have some awesome choices. Choices can be hard, like choosing between going to a movie and having popcorn, or going to your local plant nursery and purchasing a new Hosta. [Duh, everyone knows you go to the early matinee to save money first and then proceed to the nursery to purchase a trunk load of new Hostas.]

"What to do Wednesday" offers you two exciting choices during Hosta Hysteria:

Choice #1

Wednesday Gardens, include three private juried gardens that were showcased during the Indianapolis Hosta Society 2016 Garden Tour. In addition, the renowned Soules Garden, which will be open for shopping and perusing their display gardens.

THE SCHULTZ GARDEN



A mile east from downtown Indianapolis is the cities' first 'suburban' neighborhood. Woodruff Place began development in 1872 — a Victorian version of formal Italian Renaissance gardens. From the beginning, Woodruff's development possessed all the requisites of a park: three boulevard drives bisected by grassy esplanades, spacious lots, picturesque homes, clusters of graceful cast-iron statues and costly multi-tiered fountains.

One of two fabulous tour gardens in Woodruff Place is the Schultz Garden. Formal boxwood partiers form the structure of this Woodruff Place garden. Vintage hostas are planted within the par-

tiers, acting as frames, giving each Hosta cultivar its own area to shine. This landscape ties the partiers to this turn of the century home.

THE BRISSMAN GARDEN



The Brissman Garden is an extension of the Queen Anne Home, built in 1923. With over 120 different Hostas marked with small stone identifying markers, the Brissman garden is full of luscious outdoor rooms.

Brissman explained: "We have tried to make the main gardens more soothing to the eye — a blend of Zen and traditional plantings. "I have crammed in as many favorite Hostas and Japanese Maples as I have room for. . . I love to swap ideas with other avid gardeners and am happy to offer any meager advice I may pos-

sess. I have spent a good deal of time and money on the gardens, but I believe that they are not at all intimidating and show what can be done with some time and energy."

THE HOMMEL MANGAS GARDEN



Just south of Indianapolis' downtown is the Hommel Mangas Garden. Five acres of garden rooms for the purpose of playing include: the Apiary and "Ode to Indiana Hybridizer's Hosta Garden, Hosta of the Year garden, Pool garden, Hammock City, Raised Potager, Hoosier-style Japanese Garden, Creekside Oasis and labeled Biblical Plants with accompanied verses. Enveloped by a sloping terrain and mature wooded area, AHS convention-attendees/friends are invited to come and rest all day or as little desired. Corn-hole games, checkers, and the hammocks with garden magazines and iced tea are awaiting your arrival.

The Hommel Mangas Garden, only 13-minutes on your way back to the conventional hotel, is a must stop at Soules Gardens, where you can purchase rare items and enjoy their display gardens.

Choice #2
THE ROAD TRIP TO FRENCH LICK RESORT AND WEST BADEN SPRINGS HOTEL



A second offering for "What to do Wednesday" is a unique "Road Trip." You will head south of Indianapolis by bus to a very special area: the French Lick Resort with two historic hotels, French Lick Springs and West Baden Springs. Both hotels have been renovated to grande dame status, receiving multiple accolades.

Docents from Indiana Historic Landmarks will guide us in small groups, allowing us to see each hotel, hear their histories and learn their "secrets." It's lunch under the West Baden Springs

dome with an opportunity to walk the grounds that once hosted Major League Baseball teams, the rich and famous, the Jesuit brotherhood and an educational institution. We'll return to the Convention hotel ready to enjoy the evening's activities.

Time seems to fly more quickly with each passing year --- YES, IT'S MEMBERSHIP RE-NEWAL TIME AGAIN! If there is a "16" after your name on the mailing sheet which accompanied your copy of *The Hosta Journal*, then it's time to renew. --- You wouldn't want to miss any of the fun, would you?! I know this might be surprising news (and possibly somewhat distressing) to those who recently joined for just a single year immediately prior to the 2016 membership cut-off date at the end of August and I'm sorry for that ... but, remember, your membership was backdated to 01-01-16!

All AHS Memberships run from January 1 through December 31, regardless of when an individual joins or renews. The year of your membership expiration immediately follows your name on the mailing sheet which accompanies each paper publication you receive from the AHS. The second *Journal* mailing of each year (which will arrive shortly if it hasn't already) is always accompanied by a renewal form. It is important to renew in a timely manner in order to avoid the \$5.00 late fee which MUST be applied to all renewals mailed or entered online after January 15 of each calendar year --- mailing that first issue of the year individually to late renewals is a costly process!

eMembers --- Your membership renewal will also come due at the end of the year. Although a late renewal fee does not apply to eMemberships, why wait for the last minute?!

It's important to keep the AHS Membership Secretary informed of changes in your contact information. If you do not receive AHS mailings due to an unreported change of address, a \$6.00 payment is required to cover the cost of shipping and handling for the replacement issue. Please send address changes to AHSMembershipSecretary@charter.net as promptly as possible. Individuals who travel between summer and winter homes should advise the Membership Secretary of their change of address approximately 6 weeks in advance.
